Rector's Report

2015-2016 was a year more of consolidation than of change. The Beacon Parishes Mission Community has developed, grown and matured as many people have committed themselves to an organisation which helps us to share our strengths rather than threatens the individual identity of the parishes. The Mission Community newsletter, The Beacon, goes from strength to strength and helps keep everyone informed of what we are doing as does the website missioncommunity.org.uk which is frequently updated. Thanks to all involved in these ventures. Over the year I have seen a marked change in how our parishes relate to each other. There seems a greater willingness to share and travel and I have been very touched by people's generosity.

In our Mission Action Plan we took onboard Bishop Robert's priorities of Prayer, Discipleship and Serving the People of Devon with Joy. It will soon be time to review what progress we have made. I am heartened and impressed at the level of lay involvement in our services as we share the task of spreading the Good News. Especially popular services are the Lenten Compline Service in Ipplepen and Stations of the Cross in Denbury. Midweek Communion services are also well-attended. In addition to our annual Lent course we added two quiet days for people to explore their spirituality away from the busyness of parish life and we will do the same again this year. This year we will support the Archbishops' initiative to come together in prayer during the nine days leading up to Pentecost. Do join us – it might change your life.

We continue to encourage new disciples. Baptism ministry was extended to include members of the laity in some of our churches assisting me in preparing couples for this special service. We have successfully incorporated baptisms more within the main Sunday services. I hope to extend our work to post-funeral support and would welcome volunteers to help me.

Once again last year we held a Mission Community Confirmation service at which 6 people, young and less so, made their commitment to Christ in the presence of another packed church. It was a beautiful and, yet again, inspiring occasion. Sadly we follow the pattern of many churches that the youngsters are rarely to be seen after the service; but we should not despair as they will almost certainly come back when they need the ministry that the church offers. There will be another service this September in Ipplepen.

The Pastoral Care Team was finally commissioned at Ipplepen's Patronal Festival in December. So much good work goes on in the parishes and communication is so important to ensure we maximise the effect.

Over the year the various churches have contributed to charities as part of our own missional work. Especially important has been the local food bank, Homeless in Teignbridge Support.

As usual a lot of work is undertaken by teams of people In church, the churchyard and the bell tower – thanks to all of them for their dedication and service. It is getting harder to find volunteers so please help where you can or suggest ways

in which we might be more efficient in our efforts.

I commend this Annual Report to you. Thank you to contributors and to all those involved in our churches. May God bless you in all that you do and are.

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Churchwardens' Report

St Andrew's has not stood still! Change and progress has been occurring in many ways; the structure of the church facilities, church members have been baptised and confirmed, new ministries of Pastoral care and Baptism have been prayed about, people trained and commissioned whilst the daily and weekly ministry of clergy and people has continued.

Since the last APCM the Lady Chapel has been given new life as a beautiful prayerful place with a candle stand that has been well used both by parishioners and visitors. It has proved useful for small group meetings —those preparing for weddings or baptisms to name but two. The purchase ultimately of new chairs will complete the transformation when the necessary permission is finally obtained. An eye opener for the Wardens...

Refurbishing the wood floor in the nave was a 'magnum opus' during the late summer. Many thanks to the strong men of St. Andrew's for lifting out, moving and finally replacing the pews in time for Remembrance Sunday. In the meantime we have moved pews on a temporary basis to allow for space to be used more effectively for social meeting at the back of church and for children to be involved in greater comfort at Christmas and Good Friday at the front.

At the same time the lighting and sound system has been updated. All this completed for "the big clean up" in October when so many lent a hand to rid the church of dust and cobwebs. Our thanks to all of you who helped.

We have a major problem with the old boilers which are now beyond economic repair and must be replaced. We have sought advice from the Diocese and are actively seeking quotations for this major replacement the cost of which is likely to be substantial.

Our newer services introduced in 2013 continue. The lay led service on the fourth Sunday has been supported by some forty members in the congregation. We have been fortunate to have had much unstinting help from visiting Readers who give an Address and lead the Intercessions.

The lay led services on the fourth Sunday of the month have been well supported and the Lent Compline is again lay led. The monthly evening Communion Service continues on the first Tuesday of the month supported by a small but loyal group who have enjoyed time together afterwards in the Wellington.

The Rector organised two Quiet days which will be repeated again this coming year. There was a stimulating Advent course on Christian ethics and lively discussion of contemporary issues from a Christian perspective. The Lent course based on the film "The King's Speech" is in progress as we write.

There are so many opportunities offered in our parish. We are grateful to our deputy wardens for their invaluable help in organising and support for us particularly with the Posada, Compline and church reading organisation.

As churchwardens we have had enormous support from the congregation in many ways. We are very grateful to the PCC members and so many of you without whom life would be much more arduous!

To all, thank you.

But there are concerns:

Numbers slowly decrease over the years. Whilst God loves a small church it is likely to be an increasing challenge to find willing members to take over lay roles. It is in some ways a relief that this issue is shared with churches nationally but we may need to think and pray how in the longer term we change to address these issues. We suspect that the formation of our Beacon Mission Community may hold the way with more pooling of our resources. In addition there is need to give more thought and prayer to our stewardship.

We thank Peter our priest for his care, concern, prayer and vision. Both as a parish and part of the mission community we are greatly blessed.

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PCC Financial Report

Main Fund

Regular giving is our only source of income received reasonably consistently throughout the year, and this declined slightly in 2015. Amounts of other income are outside our control (e.g. fees payable for funerals and weddings). Expenditure has shown an increase when compared with the previous year.

We have a deficit on the main PCC Account of £6,645 for 2015 from ordinary activities.

As reported last year, in early 2015 the PCC invested £40,000 of the legacy left by the late Roger Griffiths for income and long-term capital growth potential, accepting that the value of this capital will fluctuate depending on the investment climate, being largely invested in Stocks and Shares through the CBF Investment Fund.

We shall see a welcome decrease in our parochial share of the Diocesan Common Fund to £40102 in 2016. (2015 £42,605).

Fabric Fund

The annual Gift Day appeal raised £4,988 by year end (2014 £3730). Expenditure included repairs to the church flooring totalling £14,399, repairs to render and to the fabric of the church totalling over £8,000, and £2,277 on upgrading the

audio system. The net deficit at year end was £13,636 (2015 deficit £90). The fabric fund's accounts and investments have until now been sufficient to enable the PCC to continue to maintain the church building to a high standard. Fuller details of activities are in Stephen Bryant's report. In early 2016 the PCC started obtaining quotes to replace the church boilers.

Reserves

As at 31 December 2015, the main unrestricted PCC fund has reserves at cost of £105,477 and the fabric fund has reserves at cost of £32,891. In addition, there are various restricted funds which are detailed in the Accounts, including a 'Million for Mission' fund of 1,088 held by the PCC on behalf of the Mission Community. It should be noted that at the present pattern of expenditure this fund will be exhausted at some time during 2016.

Total reserves held are £140,958 (2014 £165,388). These reserves are held partly in investments, partly in the CBF Church of England Deposit Fund and partly in our working capital held in bank accounts. It is the policy of the PCC to maintain a positive balance of reserves for the main PCC fund after paying all its ongoing expenses and meeting its objective of donating to charities 10% of its regular donated income, again achieved in 2015. It is also PCC policy to maintain reserves for the fabric fund to enable it to meet the cost of maintaining the fabric of the church and the churchyard, and to provide it with some funds in case of any unforeseen circumstances. Despite the depletion of funds seen in 2015 the PCC Accounts are still in fairly good shape, especially when compared to many other parishes. However, as I have detailed above, the deficits on both our main funds have been significantly higher than in previous years.

Church Hall

In addition to its own charitable activities, the PCC acts as managing trustee for the Church Hall which is constituted as a separate charity, and considers matters arising from the running of the hall at its regular meetings .A separate sub committee meets when needed. Day to day administration is delegated to Mrs Shirley Northwood, bookings secretary. A highlight of 2015 was redecorating at a cost of £1,300.00. Looking ahead, with increasing needs, the present cooker may be replaced by a more commercial one in 2016.

Secretary's Report

It is always good to get together with the other parishes and share ideas and help each other out.

The format of standing committee meetings before PCC seems to be working well and although there are more meetings for Wardens, Treasurer, Secretary and Rector, the meetings are generally shorter.

From my perspective we (the PCC) work well as a team and my thanks must go to everyone for their patience when I

make mistakes and to the Rector for his patience with my computer skills. Unfortunately our computer is somewhat elderly

but watch this space – we may be updating it!! I would also like to thank Richard Innes-Lumsden for doing the road closure paperwork for Remembrance Sunday and for all the photocopying he does.

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Safeguarding

The use of the computer system is well established and proceeding smoothly, in spite of personnel changes within the Exeter Diocese during the year. Jacque Ward, the Archdeacon of Barnstaple's Secretary, is now coordinating the computerised Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS).

The policy contained within the Legislation with regard to the categories of person requiring DBS checking has been complied with and only persons involved with Children and Vulnerable Adults need DBS checking. Applications for the Benefice Pastoral Care Team were processed. Eight people in St. Andrews, Ipplepen and three people in each of the Parishes of St. Mary the Virgin, Denbury, Ss. Peter and Paul, Broadhempston and St. John the Baptist, Woodland.

A Mission Community Safeguarding Policy document has been finalised by the Rector and adopted by all the parishes.

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Baptism Ministry Team

The Baptism Ministry team is a Mission Community ministry. We welcome any member of the congregations of our four churches to join us. Indeed at present we are only four members in total.

We have met over several occasions over the past eighteen months and presented an interim report of our progress to a joint meeting of all PCCs in July 2015.

These days Baptism tends to focus on the social aspects rather than the religious significance. The group is recommending and operating a system whereby families are prepared for Baptism.

People are prepared for Confirmation, why not for Baptism? The process involves lay people meeting with the families to discuss the religious significance and practicalities of the service. This is an attempt to reach out and make people feel welcome. The group is considering the best way to "follow up" the Baptism in the hope of keeping the family in contact with the Church.

Here is a summary of our present approach in explanation and preparation for potential parents:-

One of Jesus' last commands to his followers was 'Go and baptise' and ever since then infant baptism has been the way

of entering into the Christian 'family'. It is a service full of signs and symbols; amongst them the giving of a lighted candle and the threefold pouring of water as the priest says: 'I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.'

So it is that the child's name is spoken in the same breath as the name of God.

There are many reasons why people bring children for baptism, ranging from a wish to give thanks for a safe birth and a new life, to 'granny thinks we ought to', to a hard-to-explain feeling that it is simply the right thing to do. The church takes these and other reasons seriously and respects them, whilst wishing also to affirm its views of baptism as a 'new birth' into a new relationship with God.

Baptism (literally 'washing') requires faith (trust in God as shown in Jesus) and a commitment to try and lead a Christian life. When an infant is baptised, promises of this faith and commitment are made on behalf of the baby by the parents and godparents.

In this way they are a living sign of the Christian belief that God loves us before we love God.

We are all used to water as something vital to life; both to quench thirst and to wash in. These meanings are experienced in fresh ways in the baptism service when set alongside the Biblical understanding of water. This is true also of 'light', another essential for life and growth, but also having the meaning of living well by following the 'light of the world' Jesus Christ.

Baptism will usually take place within the main Sunday communion service of the church, when the local community can be there to welcome the child. Children over the age of ten are normally expected to be baptised at the same time as they are confirmed if they have not been baptised in infancy.

Members of the team are available to offer visits and confidential support, and a listening ear, to members of the congregation when needed. This is extended, where appropriate, to the wider community, working alongside the clergy. All have had an enhanced DBS check as part of the "Safer Recruiting" policy.

This is a new project which it is hoped will act as a 'safety net' for anyone who may find themselves going through difficult times and in need of support, and not knowing quite who to turn to.

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Churchyard Report

The committee met informally at monthly Working Parties. The Rector has checked the accuracy of many of the records and plans and most are now digitally recorded. During the year all headstones have been checked for safety and mounds levelled where possible. Staff of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission have cleaned their headstones and memorial plaque. They have also relocated one headstone at the request of family members.

The churchyard is nearly full and, apart from reserved grave spaces, room for future burials is probably limited to 2016. Teignbridge Council have confirmed that we have planning approvals for burials in the field (and separate strip of land below it) behind the church hall.

During the next year we must decide how much of the extension we will need, how we will obtain access (in addition to the access we have from Orley Road), and how best to lay out this new area. It is likely that all graves will be for single burials only because of the rocky nature of the ground. All this will need great deal of consideration and some inevitable expense.

We are grateful to the band of volunteers who have again helped David Fey cut the grass and laurel hedge and remove fallen debris from the trees. This helps ensure that our churchyard is one of the best kept in the area. Gerald Maunder has regularly cleared weeds from the areas for cremated remains, but since being taken ill is unable to do so. We acknowledge all his efforts in past years.

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<u>Fabric</u>

The building is in good order for its age but there are always ongoing works needed to maintain this standard.

The major item of work this year has been removing the pews in the centre part of the church and relaying the parquet floor on a level damp-proof base. All the pews, minus one row, have been replaced and been fixed to the floor with small brass brackets. Mr Rosenberg made expert alterations and repairs to panelling in front of the front pews.

The contractor, Mr Bell, made a very satisfactory job of refitting the parquet floor. However, the work of removing, replacing and re-fixing the pews, and repairing the floor tiling, was all carried out by the working party plus a number of very willing volunteers. Church cleaners also worked hard afterwards to remove all traces of dust and dirt. The PCC is grateful to them all for their untiring assistance which has saved the church a great deal of expense.

Tracery in the windows needs expert repair and this can be done gradually over the next few years as funds are available.

Stones in the hood moulding over the south porch have been replaced and drainage has been added beneath the doors to prevent storm water blowing in.

Work on the belfry louvres has been finished with a complete set of new louvres on the east side.

All the metal work on the outside of the church and lychgates (rainwater gutters, down pipes and light brackets) has been repainted.

The central heating boiler is in 3 working sections, each firing up as heat is needed. The top section is no longer working, and parts for the others are becoming difficult, if not impossible, to obtain. The PCC will need to consider replacing the boiler before next winter.

We as always grateful to a small working party, organised each month by Mr John Tuckett, which has carried out small maintenance jobs throughout the year, on the church, hall and churchyard. In particular they spent many hours replacing the tiles which had been removed or damaged when the parquet flooring was re-laid.

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Bellringers

We have had yet another busy year, ringing for every Sunday morning service, the lantern procession, the maypole dancers' parade on Flower Show Day, the anniversary of V.E. Day and only one wedding.

We are planning to ring for the Queen's 90th birthday and for the Picnic in the Park on the same day.

We have had only two visiting ringing teams so far this year.

Our two trainee ringers, Drew Duncan and Jim Bruce, have progressed very well, and are a very welcome asset to our team. Two more learners have joined our team – Sophie Denning and Tim Ashman (Peter's son) and they are making steady progress. We appear to have lost Alison, but Victoria Wheal and Jazz Austin are now working locally after finishing their studies at University, and join us when work permits. We have a total of twenty ringers, but rarely if ever, have they all turned up at once – it might happen!

There are plans afoot to give the ringing chamber a makeover and generally spruce it up a bit.

There is a problem giving me some concert up among the bells, namely the cill at the base of the louvered window by the sixth and seventh bells was never, it appears, to have been completed when the tower was built many years ago. When it rains against the window, water runs down onto the bell frame causing corrosion. This needs to be addressed before part of the frame has to be replaced. All the other windows have cills which slope outwards allowing the rain to run outside.

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Stewardship Committee

In 2015 the Standing Committee continued to be responsible for the allocation of the funds available for St Andrew's Church's annual giving and the Stewardship Committee did not meet as a separate committee. We have continued to give 10% of our regularly gifted income to charity to a smaller group of charities so that each charity receives a meaningful amount. Donations continue to be spread over a variety of charities including local, national UK & overseas charities and secular and Christian charities. A list of the charities supported is included in the accounts and the committee welcomes suggestions for charities to be supported in the future.

2015 has been a difficult year for St Andrew's financially as our income has fallen and our costs have risen, leading to a deficit for the year as detailed in the Treasurer's Report. It has been several years since a stewardship campaign has been run and in order to improve the financial position it is becoming more urgent that our stewardship is reviewed. As part of this work, the joint PCC for the Mission Community met in November 2015 to listen to a presentation on the Parish Giving Scheme. Under this scheme members who join will set up direct debits on a regular basis which will be paid into our church bank account and the scheme administrators will make any gift aid claims monthly rather than the finance team carrying out this exercise up to 4 months in arrears. This will improve cash flow significantly. If you wish you can authorise your donations to be index-linked to save you the trouble of remembering when to review your giving. If your circumstances change, the level of donations can be increased or reduced easily by contacting the scheme

administrators. Acknowledgement letters will be sent out each year so that givers can see the record of their donations. All transactions are treated as confidential and givers can choose to be anonymous if they wish. All costs of running the scheme are being met by the diocese which is supporting all parishes who wish to implement it.

St Andrew's Church, Ipplepen has decided to adopt the scheme and it is clear that its implementation will not only hopefully help us improve the financial position, especially with cash flow, but will also provide the finance team with additional support to ease their administrative burden which is considerable. If you are interested in using the Parish Giving Scheme for your donations please contact Roger Chamberlain who is the Project Leader. Roger will also be talking about the scheme at the APCM so if you have any questions please come to the meeting to discuss these with him.

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Messy Church Report

2015 saw a further slight decline in the numbers attending Messy Church on a regular basis. Several of those who have moved on had older children so once again our focus has been on the younger families. A number of new families have joined us but not sufficient to replace those who have left or started to come less frequently.

As in previous years, most families attending Messy Church do not regularly come to the main services at any of our Mission Community churches but have chosen Messy Church as their way of worshipping and helping their children to learn about our faith. Several families do now attend our children's services on Good Friday and Christmas Eve. In 2015 we held our first Messy Church in Broadhempston on the Beacon. Those that attended really enjoyed a different style of Messy Church and the plan is to repeat this in 2016. We also hosted Messy Church stalls at the Summer & Christmas Fayres at Ipplepen Primary School and used these as ways to meet new families. Tessa again ran a stall at the Ipplepen Cottage Garden Show.

Looking ahead to 2016, Messy Church continues to face several challenges:

- How to expand our team of volunteers? Our wonderful team started with us back in 2011 and we could not run Messy Church without them. However, if we had more people to help out with crafts then it would help with holidays and illness. Our new team of catering volunteers have done a great job in 2015 with a rota so that each person also gets a chance to join in the crafts regularly.
- How to attract new families? We still face a challenge of improving the number of families who come to Messy Church from the other Mission Community parishes and making sure that we keep attracting new families from Ipplepen as well. Anyone with contacts with families in the parishes or a flair for PR please contact Linda or Tessa!
- How to provide inspiration for the older children? We need to develop different activities designed to keep the

older children interested and motivated to keep coming to Messy Church. Alternatively we need to develop a new provision for these children beyond Messy Church. Anyone with ideas for this such as drama or music activities please get in touch.

How to keep Messy Church going financially?

There is no charge for Messy Church and, although we ask for donations towards the cost of the craft materials, the food and the heating & electricity used at the hall, these do not usually cover our costs. As numbers have fallen this problem has been exacerbated. Fundraising ideas such as the toy stall at the school Christmas Fayre, the wonderful paintings by Huguette Standish and the second-hand stall at the Cottage Garden Show have all generated some income but not enough to plug the gap. As a result we continue to be subsidised by the Million for Mission grant provided by the Diocese to the Mission Community. 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Sunday Club Report

Unfortunately in 2015 Sunday Club has not managed to continue at the level achieved in 2014. This was due to a number of factors but key among them is the need for a volunteer coordinator to arrange the rotas and themes and volunteers who are happy both to plan and to run sessions. Numbers of children attending also reduced so further publicity is needed. The timing of Sunday Club also needs reconsidering as there have been a number of occasions when it has clashed with other Mission Community events. It is hoped that in 2016, Sunday Club can be revived and brought back in its original planned format:

- the aim is to offer families, in particular those who attend Messy Church, another family friendly point of access to the church community and to help the children (and their parents) grow in their faith and, hopefully, move towards confirmation;
- it is important that the children and parents understand that the Eucharist is at the heart of our worship so Sunday Club is held on a Sunday when there is a communion service;
- the Sunday Club activity is only for about half an hour during the first half of the service and the children return to church after intercessions and before the Peace so

that they will be present during the consecration and communion parts of the service;

- although parents are welcome to come to Sunday Club with their children, the aim is that parents feel comfortable staying in church for the whole service while the children attend Sunday Club;
- during Sunday Club the children listen to a story from the Bible, often linked to the readings for that Sunday's church service in the lectionary, then join in an activity or craft based on the story or on a related theme;
- we try to encourage the children to think about the meaning of the stories and how they relate to our lives now;
- once the craft activity is completed we rejoin the church service and often the children have a chance to show the congregation what they have created;
- after returning to church the children can join their parents but we encourage them to sit together at the front of the church so that they can see as much of the service as possible and the Sunday Club helpers take them up for a blessing during communion.

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Newton Abbot and Ipplepen Deanery Synod

Three meetings were arranged for the year 2015. The first was held on March 5th and it mentioned the launch of a New Parish Giving Scheme. There was no report about the General Synod as The Ven. Dettmer could not attend the deanery meeting. The Joint Chairs' Report listed six points that came from the November 2014 meeting which discussed ways to make a more dynamic Deanery Synod. These included:-

- The Spring Meeting (no.1) and the Autumn meeting (no.3) are scheduled after Diocesan and General Synod meetings so that representatives can report back and issues raised can be discussed.
- The Summer meeting (no. 2) unless there is no pressing business, the Deanery Synod would meet as

- a worship group. It was suggested and agreed that the new Archdeacon of Totnes the Ven. D. Dettmer is invited to speak.
- 3. Synods 1 and 3 would include reports from Mission Communities and Parishes regarding problems they face and discuss these issues to seek solutions.
- To invite outside speakers who can bring expertise on topics arising from developments in the Diocese which are related to the concerns of this Deanery.
- 5. Small group work would be a more common feature where views are to be shared with the group and then with the deanery synod.
- 6. Select venues that are more suitable meeting places which have better facilities.

The Summer meeting was held at St. Mary's Abbotsbury and a talk was given by the Ven. Dettmer. The Autumn meeting in November was cancelled as very few people were able to attend due to there being a gas leak at the Penn Inn roundabout and traffic was at a standstill. Sue was one of the few who made the meeting.
