Planning a Medieval Market Fayre: The Denbury Hug revealed!

Back at the end of 2016, the question of what to do for the 700th Anniversary of the Church in Denbury reared its head in a PCC meeting. I don't know when or how we decided on a celebration weekend, but we "booked a Bishop" for the Sunday marking our Patronal. Then came the question, "What shall we do on Saturday?"....

So...I've got used to being volunteered by now! With some trepidation I called a meeting of the groups within the village, back in April 2017. 25 people packed into the Church Cottage! (We almost ran out of cake!). Right from the start, we had in mind that this should be the "Secular" day, celebrating the Church's history in Denbury, with Sunday as the "Sacred" celebration of the Church's role within Denbury. I proposed a Medieval Market Fayre. A proper Market, NOT a Church fundraiser... lit the blue touch paper and stood back!


Wow! What a response! The School took on the idea of creating a permanent memorial (which will be stunning), held a Medieval Arts Week, and will provide a Pageant and Maypole dancing as entertainment on the day. The Gardening Society, Flower and Produce Show and Allotment Society are providing food and produce stalls. The Stitchers group have been creating costumes and bunting all year. The Coffee Drinkers are selling pies. The Denbury



May Fayre Committee have twice supported us with generous grants. The awesome Glas-Denbury team will set up the site and run activities. A group of villagers are putting on a Mummers Play. The Arts
Group – a themed
artwork, and a Medieval
photo booth (!). The
Bible Group – an
exhibition in Church.
Members of the Archive
Group – background

research and displays. **The Union** will have a hog roast, **Aunty Moo's** is creating a Medieval icecream flavour (!), and all the planned stalls and sideshows are from **Denbury based enterprise and talent**. Even the **Coffee Mates** are threatening to come – as mad monks!

We've had individuals offering everything from borrowed bunting, to making souvenir pilgrim badges for those coming in




Medieval gear, to cutting 200+ coppiced sticks for a hobby horse project. Musicians for our parade to the Church & Green – why not? Would we like some crumhorns? Will you be Bishop Stapledon? No problem! A horse? – for the Bishop – of course! All I've had to do is keep people informed and try not to get in the way too much!

It has yet to happen. It may get rained on, the tents might fall down but – you know what? – it won't matter. Because the extraordinary wave of goodwill which has carried this project forward HAS happened. Denbury people have proved once again that the Denbury Hug is real. It exists! We've seen it in action now, and so many times over the years...and I've no doubt it helped build the Church, 700 years ago, too!

The sun shone on Denbury on June 10th meaning we were able to hold our annual churchyard service out of doors this year. Once or twice in recent years we have had to hold the service in the church due to inclement weather which slightly reduces the impact of the event.

The service provides an opportunity for families whose loved ones lie in the churchyard to meet to give thanks for the lives of those they no longer see and also to experience the atmosphere of this special place. The number of attendees this year exceeded expectations with extra seats having to be produced from all directions as people continued to arrive.

Tessa led an uplifting and thoughtful service which was followed by refreshments and conversation in the church cottage.

The churchyard looked in tip top condition for the service due to the fact a working party had been held the day before to give the church and the churchyard a spring clean.

A good number of villagers and church folk arrived for duty armed with spades/forks/secateurs and buckets and worked for several hours in the heat weeding and pruning, clearing gravestones, tidying paths, clearing gutters etc.

A further working party concentrated on cleaning the church which looked in tip top condition following a lot of concentrated hard work by the team.

Preparations for the 700th anniversary of the church are proceeding at a pace. With the encouragement of Monica, our commissioned

artist, the schoolchildren have been instrumental in producing a fabulous mosaic with all the children contributing to its creation. The Denbury Stitchers group have produced some authentic costumes for villagers to wear on the day. A very full, varied and exciting weekend beckons.

The monthly meeting of Denbury menfolk "Coffee Mates" held on the second Thursday recently celebrated its 5th anniversary.

The idea originally stemmed from a conversation between Tom New and Mick Sutherland-Cook and has continued to grow over the years. On occasion up to 16 attendees have squeezed into church cottage to enjoy an hour and a half of conversation on hugely diverse topics over a coffee or two and a piece of cake (or two). This has become a very popular part of village social life.

The village is settling down again following the conclusion of the annual, hugely popular Glas-Denbury festival held over the weekend of the 9th/10th July however this quieter period will not be for long. We have the arrival of our new rector Andrew at the end of August quickly followed by the 700th anniversary celebrations.

Lots therefore to look forward to.



Renovation project: we are now into phase 2 of the project and have applied for a Faculty to cover the following: a temporary screen between the Tower and the Nave to reduce heat loss through the Tower; steel beams to strengthen support under the bellframe; display panels and a computer console for a proposed Heritage area in the South Aisle. In addition, it is planned that Carrek, the contractor who did such an excellent job re-rendering the outside wall of the South Aisle, will return in November to repair the damaged plasterwork on the inside of the South wall. This will be a 4 to 6 week job.

Heritage area: the proposed heritage area in the South Aisle will provide a permanent site in the village for the Broadhempston Archive and Local History Group (BALHG) to mount displays and provide access via touchscreen technology to records on the history of the village and its

people. Initially, the displays will focus on the history of the church and its interesting artefacts. The two photographs are of roof bosses in the church and are examples of the surprises in store: the first shows four gossiping people, probably dating back to the late medieval period; the second shows a female face in profile with cloth cap.



Experience Church

The Experience Team invited the Mission Community's Primary Schools to come into their parish church and take part in Experience Church, an interactive and multi-sensory programme. It followed the same format as the previous Experience afternoons but unlike the others it looked at the church and how Christians worship and practice their faith rather than on one of the major festivals. This time the stations were The Font: The Church Welcomes, The Pulpit/Lectern: The Church Teaches, The Prayer Desk/Kneelers: The Church Prays, Stained Glass Windows: The Church Serves, The Altar: The Church Celebrates and The Door: The Church Shares. Each station focused on what happens there, what did Jesus do, what does the Church do and what can we do?

I must again thank everyone who took part to make this such a worthwhile event for the two schools that were able to send a class along. Without them and their enthusiasm it would not have been the success it was. The children always seemed very engaged in every activity and wanted to stay longer at a station than time would permit. I must also thank the volunteers for the amount of preparation they put into the art and craft items and the altar frontals, one for each church, which were completed by the children. Experience

On the 7th June, Sycamore Class (Year 6) from Ipplepen Primary School went to St. Andrew's to take part in some activities, to help find out about the Church. In five groups, we learnt about the High Altar, the font, the pulpit and made paper doves, wrote our own prayers and designed stained glass windows.

The High Altar

We all sat down and listened to information about the High Altar. Then, we cut out felt shapes of the chalice, the paten (a small plate used to hold the Communion bread) and the cross. These were then attached to an altar cloth. At the end, the leaders gave us flying saucer sweets to represent the communion bread!

The Font

The font is where people come to be baptised. At the font we gently folded paper up, wrote the word, 'welcome' on it and put it in the water where it slowly opened out. You can be baptised at any age. It is a welcome to the Church.

Paper Doves and the Pulpit

We had to cut out the shape of a dove with a hole in the middle, fold up another piece to make a fan and slot it through the hole. We coloured them in and hung them up in a small tree. The pulpit is where some words in the bible are explained in easier words so everyone can understand it more.

Stained Glass Windows

In our groups, we all looked at the stained glass windows. Everybody was given a jam jar to decorate with coloured pens. At the end, we carefully placed a candle inside.

Writing Prayers

Everyone wrote two prayers on a blue and a yellow piece of paper. On one piece, we wrote a worldwide prayer like, "I pray to stop pollution." Then, on the other piece was a more personal message. After we had finished we stuck the prayers on the wire cross.

We really enjoyed all of the lovely activities we took part in. It was an interesting way to end our day and learn more about the Church.

Professor Stephen Hawking -"food for thought"

Homeless people in Cambridge enjoyed a three course lunch on the day of Professor Stephen Hawking's funeral, thanks to his family.

About 50 people were fed at Wesley Methodist Church on the day of the funeral, where notes on the diners' table read:" Today's lunch is a gift from Stephen." Alex Collis, the regional manager for Food Cycle, the charity that received the donation that helped make the lunch possible, said that the professor's daughter, Lucy, had wanted to "do something positive to mark the day". The meal, made from food that would have been wasted, included leek and parsnip soup, ratatouille, and fruit sundae. Food Cycle served more than 6,300 meals in Cambridge last year.

During her marriage to Stephen Hawking while dealing with the progression of his illness, Jane Hawking suffered from depression. In a 2004 interview, she cited her Christian faith as giving her hope during her marriage and the depression she experienced as a result of being his then-caregiver.

In that interview, Jane noted the irony in her faith-based strength to support him in light of Stephen Hawking's well-known atheism.

More good ideas!

Following on from the last edition:

- To sharpen scissors, simply cut through sandpaper
- Use rubber bands to help open a jar easily; place one around the jar lid and another around the middle of the glass. The rubber provides friction to prevent your hands from slipping
