# St. Andrew's Church, Ipplepen Annual Report 2019 – 2020

## 1 Rector's Report

In the pages that follow are reports that would have got to you back in March had not the pandemic meant that much of life including APCM's was stopped taking place. Some of us may have been very thankful for a reprieve from APCM's!!

At this point when we are starting to explore what it means to be gathering as a church again it is good to read these reports to see where we were before lockdown happened.

We have all journeyed through lockdown and the enforced space from gathered church life which has produced many shoots of fresh growth. As we remerge the other side of lockdown we are re-establishing our collective life together. This collective life has three main strands:

- Worship
- Discipleship
- Service

At the current time - August, September and October - we have a particular focus on the first of these and learning together what it means to be able to gather again to pray and worship. # 2 Churchwardens' Report

St. Andrew's has had a good year.

Work recommended by the Quinquennial report has all been completed, some of it by our Working Party, who have kept the church and churchyard in excellent repair: my grateful thanks to them and to John Lynch, who helps us in grass-cutting and putting out traffic cones and dustbins when needed.

Renovation work has now been completed on the stonework on all the windows and several doors and they are looking extremely good. The rear of the church hall has been cleared and asphalt put down. Fire extinguishers and electrical appliances have all been tested and are in good repair. A new path will shortly be laid between the gate by the church hall and the field gate, which will lead to the churchyard extension. We obtained a grant of £1,000 from Rural Aid towards the cost.

There have been very successful social and/or fundraising events for which I would like to thank our Hospitality team. They have done an excellent job, with the Christmas Fayre, Sausage & Mash & Quiz evening, Cream Tea, picnic and much more.

Andrew has tried out several service plans this year, to find a pattern which is manageable for him and which suits all the churches in our mission community. The present system appears to be working well. We have had good links with our Methodist friends, with several joint services including two café-style ones.

Links with the primary school have been very successful, with Andrew and Mrs. Lacey's help and encouragement. The older children have had Christmas Experience in church and will shortly be having Easter Experience, which teaches the children about these two major festivals. The school has held their Harvest and Carol services in church. They continue to provide waiters for the Lunch Club: it is lovely to see how well the children and 'clients' enjoy each other's company.

It takes a large number of people to keep the church running smoothly, and I would like to thank them all for their devoted and valuable service. My grateful thanks to my deputies, Geraldine, Mike and Clive, to members of the P.C.C., to our Server Peter Gage, to the sacristans, readers, intercessors, Chalice administrators, sidespeople, coffee-makers, cleaners, bell-ringers, choir members, flower arrangers and to those who open and close the church each day. Have I missed anyone out? — my apologies if so: the church could not manage without you all. One has only to look at the Visitor's Book to see how much people appreciate our church.

We look forward now to the weekend of Joy 2020 ( $1^{st} - 3^{rd}$  May) when our three bishops, Robert, Nick and Jackie will be visiting the Totnes Archdeaconry and taking part in various events and services.

Following advice from the diocese, precautions taken during the coronavirus outbreak will, at present, include not shaking hands during the Peace, and distributing bread but not wine during Communion.

#### 3 Administration

#### 3.1 Secretary's Report

Since our APCM in 2019 we have had 4 PCC Standing Committee Meetings and 4 PCC meetings. Minutes including APCM minutes are always in church after these meetings for anyone to read.

We also held a meeting with Samantha Upham – Development team advisor from the Totnes Deanery. The consultation was part of the Deanery Plan on how we will work together as a Deanery and how we are to be people of God in this place and is a research project. Every parish across the Deanery took part and as well as members of our own PCC representatives from Broadhempston and Woodland attended.

We as PCC members have all signed declarations complying with 'Fit and Proper Persons' legislation.

Needless to say, the Wardens have had separate meetings and my thanks go to them for all their hard work.

Finally my thanks go to the Rector and all PCC members and Wardens for their support.

#### 3.2 PCC Financial Report

I have prepared the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019 (see attached) which have been reviewed by Malcolm Dando in his role as independent reviewer.

#### **GENERAL FUND**

There was deficit from ordinary activities of £15,029 compared to a deficit in 2018 of £5,463, and overall a deficit of £16,400 compared to a deficit in 2018 of £7,375.

The reasons for the increase in ordinary deficit are;

A reduction in income of £1,325. There was no one big factor, but a combination in small reductions across the board. This reduction was despite an excellent performance from the Social and Fundraising team and an increase in General donations.

A significant increase in costs is by far the biggest cause of the deficit. The most significant items being Rector's expenses, our share of the costs of the Rector's PA and Church Office, and the Parochial Share payable to the Diocese. There was also the one-off set-up costs for the Church Office. Heating costs also increased, but this is something very much beyond our control.

As far as assets go, the deficit has led to a significant reduction in cash reserves to net £23k, £3k of which applies to restricted funds. However, the good news is that the General Fund investments performed very well in 2019 increasing by £20k to £126k. Therefore, despite the large deficit in income and expenditure, the overall value of the General Reserves actually increased during the year.

#### **FABRIC FUND**

The Fabric Fund shows a deficit of £5,529 after paying for roof repairs of £2.9k and the second part of the Clock Repairs. Gift Day Income collected in the year was also down, but partly as a result of certain donors asking for their donations to be applied to the General Fund. There were also a few donations given after the year end.

The cash balances at the year end showed £3,312 on the main account and £10,197 in the Deposit Account. Again, the Fabric investments performed well increasing by nearly £6k to a market value of £37k.

#### **SUMMARY**

I have spoken at length during 2019 for the need to increase General income to offset the increase in costs in running the Church. Some success is already being seen and the Fundraising and Social income during the year was a genuine success. I also believe we are making progress in attracting new people who may like to give on a regular basis. The performance of the investments is also great news, but we cannot rely on this to offset deficits in the long term.

In conclusion, like many parishes St. Andrew's faces some significant challenges in the coming years as rising costs are likely to continue. However, the reserves built up in the past, wisely invested, mean that the PCC can at least take the time to put in place strategies to increase income.

I recommend that the PCC approve the 2019 Accounts, subject to the Independent Review finding no issues.

# 4 The buildings

#### 4.1 Fabric

The fabric remains in good condition for the age of the building, with no unexpected problems.

During the year the main works have been the repair to the stonework and tracery of those windows which were not attended to in 2018. The lead flashings of the chancel roof were renewed and the door to the chancel and the west doors were sealed and decorated. At the same time the stonemasons carried out minor repairs to stonework on the tower, vestry roof, south stair turret and lychgates. These works were required by the 2018 architect's survey and were carried out by Woodbury Stone.

In March the clock machinery was re-installed after an overhaul, and thanks are due to Charles Quartley and the bell ringers who assisted, and Mr. Tom Allan who provided safety scaffolding free of charge. We are grateful to Mr. John Tuckett and his working party for carrying out many small repairs to the church on a regular basis, and for maintaining the rainwater systems, roofs and gutters.

After many years helping maintain the church building Mr. Tuckett has retired from leading the working party, and he was suitably thanked at a morning service.

#### 4.2 Bells, tower and ringers

We organised the bottle tombola at the Christmas Fayre on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> November. At the same time there was a Wedding Blessing for David and Meredith (nee Head) Fortuna from the U.S.A. She was an Ipplepen girl and we were unexpectedly asked to ring for this blessing. We were helping at the fayre anyway so we donated £100 from the ringing fee to the Church funds.

We only had one visiting band of ringers this year and their donation helped towards our bell fund.

We were saddened when Fin Heath, after 27 years as a ringer, announced his retirement. He is sorely missed as he was one of our stalwart ringers.

#### 4.3 Churchyard

The committee met informally at monthly working parties. During the year all headstones have been checked for safety and mounds levelled where possible.

The churchyard is nearly full and, apart from reserved grave spaces, room for future burials is very limited. During 2020 we aim to fence off part of the extension and lay out this new area for consecration. A pipe has been laid under the path surrounding the church hall so that a main water tap can installed in the extension in due course.

We are grateful to John Lynch, who has again maintained the churchyard to a high standard, and to the band of volunteers who have again helped cut the grass and trim the laurel hedge. The working party also removed fallen debris from the trees each month, and carried out repairs to the walls and gates.

Back in January there was one particular birthday party which I will remember with fondness, because in all my years as Booking Secretary it was the first time I had ever been invited to the party, and they could not compliment enough both St. Andrew's Church and the hall and everyone involved with St. Andrew's as such a warm and friendly environment, stating they wished they had something like this within their own town.

To conclude, I always say it is a great Team who are involved with the hall and team stands for Together, We, Achieve, More and so I would like to thank all the hirers of the hall throughout the year, and for the support of Jane and Churchwardens to whom I report all the bookings each week. Thanks to Caren who has held the diary for me when I have been on holiday and special thanks to Jane who throughout the winter has been setting the appropriate heating each week to keep my hirers warm and comfortable. And with happy hirers there is less for me to worry about!! Thanks to Phill our Church Treasurer to whom I pay all the monies collected by me each month, and which I trust will help to see our Church Hall in good health for many more decades to come.

# 5.2 Promoting a Safer Church ...... Safeguarding

The Parish Safeguarding Officer, Carol Robinson, has recently retired from that post after many years of loyal and hard - working service. With her extensive knowledge and experience, Carol has carried out all necessary disclosure and barring checks across the Beacon Mission Community churches. She has kept abreast of the ever changing procedures and developments as prescribed by the Diocese and the House of Bishops and in so doing has attended all relevant training events. All her tasks have been carried out with great integrity and sensitivity. We have all benefitted from her significant contribution.

We continue to promote a safer church in which we can demonstrate our compassion and vigilance in the management of risk to children, young people and vulnerable adults. For example:

The Church of England Guidance on safer recruitment was used in the process of the appointment of Caren Marten as PA/Administrator to Andrew our Rector.

The Pastoral Care team has been issued with guidelines for home visiting from the Parish Safeguarding handbook.

The parents/Guardians of those in the Youth Choir completed permission forms when the children/young people joined the choir.

Until the appointment of a new safeguarding officer, the Rector is currently responsible for safeguarding, supported by the local advocate, in line with the policy.

Safeguarding is clearly an issue for all the churches in the Mission Community and agreed common practice will continue to be developed.

#### 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2019

'A guide to Deanery Planning MAP' - every Deanery in Exeter has to submit a 3 year plan by Autumn of 2020. This included an update from Samantha Upham, the development Advisor for Totnes Archdeaconry, who advised us that the consultations is well under way with all our parishes. This included the date set for the 7<sup>th</sup> October for MISSION Community to look and discuss. Also we had been urged to check all Health and safety documents in the light of the Grenfell Fire Disaster.

#### 18<sup>th</sup> September 2019

Samantha Upham started the process for our Deanery plan.

How can the Deanery best serve the Mission communities? This will be discussed at Synod in the next 12 months. Consultation is underway with all parishes. We now have 5 statements. Samantha was booked to come and talk to our Beacon parish. On 7<sup>th</sup> October. Hannah Dunn gave a talk on 'Setting God's people free'.

#### 29th January 2020

Rev. Jon Marlow, Mission Community Development Team Leader for the Diocese was the guest speaker.

'Joy 2020' this is a weekend of events 1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> May for the Bishops in Mission. All clergy, lay reps and readers are encouraged to attend.

Also we had the latest report from the Diocese of Exeter on the progress of ongoing partnerships and projects in THIKA from Jane Inwood our link with the THIKA diocese.

There were two discussion sessions, on 'How may services be made more attractive?' and – 'What can make the most impact on our communities?'

#### 6.4 Ipplepen Primary School

All of these services and celebrations have been very well attended and we will continue with the same cycle into next year, if we are allowed.

In the Autumn term, we held a celebration for harvest and the children and their families collected a large amount of foods which added to the church donation for HITS.

We also held a very enjoyable service to celebrate Christmas, led by our present Year 6 who supported and encouraged the Foundation stage. These 2 year groups retold the birth of Jesus through actions, songs and readings.

Our Eco Councillors again attended the Remembrance Service and were part of the uniformed parade and laid a wreath to remember the fallen.

Finally, I would like to say a very big thank you to everyone in the church for their help and support with the shoe box issue.

Ipplepen is a village community school, therefore we have been busy continuing to develop links. We have been involved with the following: we send 4 children to help serve at the Church Community lunch each month. In addition to this we have sent the choir to sing at Christmas and they will return later in the school year. The choir also have sung at the Memory café.

We have supported the local lantern parade, each class made their own large lantern and many of our children accompanied by their parents carried them in the parade, finishing in the church for a delicious cup of "hot squash".

As a school we have taken part in an Arts/ History week in association with the Ipplepen History Society and worked with Exeter University on the archaeological dig.

We have established good links with The Grange Residential Hotel and send a class a month to visit the residents. We have also begun a Spanish project led by Patty Rojas with our youngest children and the residents.

If there are links which I have not begun to access please let me know. I strive to continue to develop strong community links and look forward to meeting you at village events.

Our Year 6 children went to Buckfast Abbey to take part in a United School Federation Christmas advent event. At present we are working on a project with Exeter Cathedral and will be taking part in a concert in the Cathedral at the end of February.

At the end of the summer term Year 6 will again be involved with the community award and will be cleaning the church and clearing the grounds.

At school we always welcome visitors and would love to have members of the church come in to hear readers or read their favourite story.

The school motto is Thinking, Caring, Learning and Sharing. This is the reason that the school takes such an integral part in community and church life.

We are delighted to have four youngsters from our school each month to assist at meal times. They are a delight and amaze us with their ability to interact with a variety of people they do not know. Each child joins a different table to chat after serving each course. We have noticed that conversation flows better when at least six people sit together. Rose and I are now arranging the tables to achieve this.

None of this would happen each month without our faithful band of volunteers – our wonderful cooks, veg prep and service folk, our drivers and our speakers. All take a pride in their work and care for our guests so well. Thank you to everyone.

Just a note: The Environmental Health Office visited during February's lunch. I am happy to say St. Andrew's kitchen has maintained its hygiene score of 5.

We are in need of more volunteers – veg. prep and meal service. Also, another cook would be much appreciated.

We mix freely with all people being ready to bind up the broken hearted

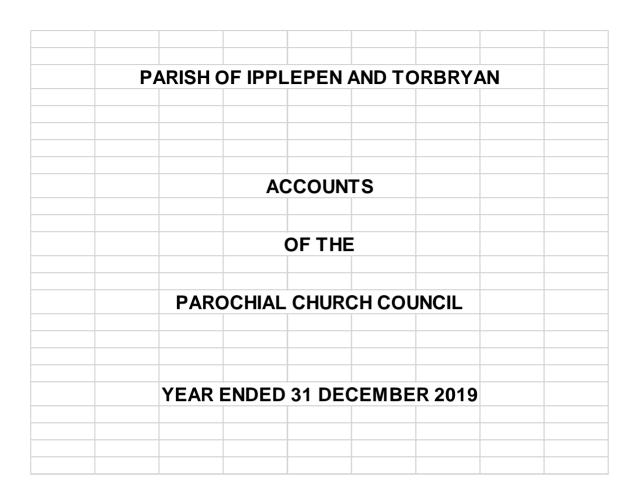
