### **Reflection by Tessa Amies**

Sunday next before Lent – Valentine's Day Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> February 2021

Red hearts, red roses, candle-lit dinners, chocolates, more red hearts, cards with hearts and no signature . . . . .

All associated with St. Valentine's Day, but why? Who was he or she, why are they worth remembering? Did St. Valentine exist?

It seems there were at least two saints called Valentine, possibly more. One was a Roman priest and doctor who was probably martyred on the Flamian Way just outside Rome in around 350 AD. Another Valentine became the Bishop of Turni (a town about 60 miles from Rome). He too was brought to Rome and martyred in around 273 AD. This Valentine is the patron saint of bee keepers, and also those who suffer from epilepsy and the plague. (Maybe we need to pray to him at the present time?). There may have been another Valentine, who came from North Africa and was martyred about this time too. I am sure all three of these people were kind, compassionate and lovely people but none of them seem particularly connected to romantic love.

The idea might be a throw back to the Roman festival of Lupercalia, celebrated about the same time of year; connected with fertility rites and a lot of running around with very little on!

Perhaps the most endearing explanation of Valentine's romantic love appears in Medieval times. it was observed that birds began to choose their mates round about this time of year. Our very own Chaucer mentions this in his poem 'Parliament of Fowls':

"For this was St. Valentine's Day when every bird comes to choose his mate."

Some nobility of the time sent love notes during the bird mating season. For instance the Duke of Orleans, imprisoned in the Tower of London, wrote to his wife, Anne in February 1415 that he was "already lovesick" and calling her his "very gentle valentine".

Love, in all its forms is certainly worth celebrating, perhaps all the time not just on one day! Our English language is not too precise at distinguishing the different meanings of the word.

There is of course romantic love celebrated to-day. Then we have maternal or paternal love - the love of a parent for their child. Shown so beautifully in many paintings of the Virgin and Child. There's filial love, brotherly love for siblings and family. Love borne of respect and regard for another person. For instance, by Elisha for Elijah in to-day's passage from 2 Kings 2 1-12. Elijah is about to be taken up into heaven in the fiery chariot and Elisha does not want to say good-bye.

But, the greatest love of all is that shown by GOD to his people. Shown in the Gospels from birth to apparent death. We'll be exploring that once again during Lent and in the run up to Easter. God's love is unconditional and everlasting. St. Paul often speaks of God's love for us in his letters, take a look at 1 Corinthians chapter 13.

Meanwhile have a good St. Valentine's Day. We can watch the Denbury doves fly over the houses, choosing their mate and listen to their gentle coos down the chimney.
