This week's Online Sermon

Rev'd Samantha Stayte shares this sermon for the 4th Sunday of Easter, reflecting on what it means for Jesus to be the 'Good Shepherd' and the importance of listening to His voice.

Fourth Sunday of Easter John 10:11-18 Sunday 25th April 2021

This week we hear the fourth of Jesus' "I am" statements found in John's Gospel, "I am the Good Shepherd". When Jesus first made this statement people would often see shepherds wandering around near their villages with their flocks of sheep so people would have immediately understood what He meant. Even today the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is very familiar and it conjures up a sense of love, care, protection, intimacy and closeness.

Jesus says that he knows his own sheep and that they know him. Jesus is using the word "know" to express an intimate relationship of love, not just having knowledge about someone. He is not using it in the sense we use the word when we say, "do you know so and so?" meaning have you heard of them or have you met them. When Jesus says, "I know them," it means he knows them individually and intimately, he knows them by name. They are not anonymous, not just part of the flock.

Jesus knows each of us completely. There may be times when we are a mystery to family or friends, even at times a mystery to ourselves, but we are never a mystery to Christ. He knows our temperament and our moods. He knows our deepest thoughts, our silent longings, our private triumphs and even our shameful secrets. There is nothing he doesn't know about us and yet still he loves us. He loves us so much that he died for us. There will never be a time when He will say, "You're not worthy". There will never be a time when He will ever abandon you. What better shepherd to guide us in our life and lead us than the one who knows us and loves us best.

As sheep of Jesus' flock, how do we know our shepherd? The one who nurturers, guides and protects us. How do we learn to recognise His voice amongst all the opposing voices we hear around us? We learn about Him from reading scripture, then sharing and reflecting on what we have read. We form a personal relationship by spending time with Him in prayer, listening as much as talking. We share our experiences of Him in our lives with others. In these activities and through worship we will hear His voice. Then we have to discern what action we need to take.

The image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd also challenges us as we serve/shepherd each other and the communities we are part of. We are to share His concern for those who are in need or in trouble, for the sick and for the poor, and for the injustices and inequalities we see around us. Like a good shepherd who builds up a relationship with their sheep so that they know when they are sick, hungry or hurt, we are to know and understand our communities. It is through the building of relationships that we will know their needs which will enable us to show our love in practical ways using our time and talents where and when it is needed.
