FATHER'S DAY;

'PEACE BE STILL'

Today's Gospel reading tells that great story of Christ calming the storm.

The large crowds, the need to get away, the boat on the lake, the storm, waves crashing over the boat, the disciples - afraid, they wake Jesus up, 'PEACE BE STILL' he commands, the storm subsides . . .

Christ the leader, Christ taking command, Christ the Father to his disciples, his children, acknowledging their fear, calming them, calming the storm, defending them, supporting them. The father looking after his children, loving his children. A great example of a Dad!

This Sunday is Father's Day, a day to celebrate and thank our fathers. A relatively new entry in our church calendar. maybe an 'americanism', maybe commercial, I am not sure. Anyway, we all had or have a father and a few thoughts and words of thanks are always welcome! Some fathers are good, some are less good, most are somewhere in between. I hope you have good memories of your father.

I am going to ask you to pause for a minute and think of atleast two good things your father did for you. Think back to your earliest memories, your childhood, early adulthood, how did he help you?

For mine I will nominate;

- a) teaching me my tables. I am still good at knowing what 8x8 is and what makes 54. I can still keep up with my children and grandchildren even if I did fail O level Maths twice, and this is all thanks to my father who used to teach them to me every morning while he was shaving!
- b) and then there was teaching me to drive and in particular how to change a puncture (down to 3 minutes at one time!) Thanks Dad it's been useful. And of course, there's all that love and support he gave me. How about yours?

Then of course we are lucky enough to have a second father as well. Our heavenly Father, the one we pray to using his special prayer. 'Our Father, who art in heaven . . .' We assume God is male, a father figure, God could easily be female, a mother figure, maybe God is above all that and has no specific gender at all. But there is someone or something whom we acknowledge as our God, our father, our mother, our leader, our creator, our inspiration, our provider. Once again I invite you to spend a few minutes recalling at least two good things your God has done for you. . . . (perhaps this is harder??)

The Psalm set for to-day (part of Psalm 107) has been chosen to go with the Gospel reading. If time, I thoroughly recommend a quick read. Here's a taste.

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good
and his mercy endures for ever.

He stilled the storm in a whisper and quietened the waves of the sea.
Then they were glad because of the calm and he brought them
to the harbour they were bound for.

This throws up a question. The psalm would have been written sometime before Mark wrote his Gospel; before the story of Christ calming the storm would have been written down. How then did the psalmist know about it? Is the psalm a prophecy or is it one of those classic events that occurs both in the Old Testament as well as the New? (e.g. the feeding of lots of people as in the feeding of the 5,000)? Biblical scholars please help!

Finally, may I share this rather optimistic quote I read this morning:

'I believe in the sun, even when it is not shining!'

(A good line to think on when walking the dog and maybe a bit of a faith booster too!)
