Ninth Sunday after Trinity John 6:24-35 Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> August 2021

#### 'TWO BREADS'

When did you last eat some bread? Maybe quite recently. Bread is often part of our daily food. To-day's readings are all about Bread. Bread to feed the body and bread to feed the soul. The reading from the Old Testament tells that great story of 'Manna from Heaven', or manna in the wilderness.

The Israelites had left Egypt and were trudging over the vast Sinai Desert. Food and water were beginning to run out, they weren't getting anywhere. They began to grumble 'atleast we had food and water in Egypt, we've nothing here except miles and miles of desert.'

Moses heard their complaint and talked to God about it. That evening a flock of quail settled near them in the desert and the following morning a layer of dew gave way to a fine flaky flour which could be used for making bread. Meat and flour (manna) were provided every day, except the sabbath. They were told to take just enough for one day; if they tried to store it the manna turned sour and attracted maggots.

For the practically minded - who like an explanation - quail fly over the Sinai desert in late summer on their migratory flight from Egypt and Sudan towards their wintering grounds in the north. Manna is a white milky liquid which is secreted from trees when the tree is attacked by insects. But does this story need these explanations? For many the manna from heaven is an example of God's love for his people. A great example of bread as a physical sustenance.

The Gospel reading from St. John is centered on one of the great 'I am' sayings of Jesus.

I am the bread of life, who ever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never thirst. The feeding of the 5,000 had recently taken place. Many people had received food, no one went hungry. Jesus was now turning things up a gear; not just helping the physical needs of the people for bread, but looking towards their spiritual needs as well. He is referring to the daily sustenance of the soul, as well as looking towards the bread and wine of the Last Supper.

Bread can be seen as a symbol of unity having many grains in one substance. When broken and shared it may represent a shared and united life.

Bread is made from flour; flour usually comes from wheat, but it can come from corn, rye, soya, rice, oats and even potato. It is used in all parts of the world and throughout history. To-day the grain is milled in factories to produce a fine white flour, in past times it could be produced by ginding the grain in pestle and mortars or between two large mill stones. It can be coarse enough to break teeth or very fine. Flour is mixed with water and cooked to produce bread.

Sometimes yeast is added to make the bread more interesting and digestible. (Yeast in bread can be likened to the Holy Spirit in our lives, but that's another story!).

Imagine, for a moment a kilted Scottish warrior of the C16th, striding over moorland and heath, preparing for the night. Taking his oatmeal from his bag, mixing it with water and cooking it on a hot stone in the fire - a quick and satisfying meal.

God provided bread for the Israelites of the Old Testament to satisfy their physical needs. Now he provides Bread as a spiritual sustenance to satisfy his people in the New Testament and to-day. Eat well!

Amen.
