### **Reflection by Rev'd Andrew Down**

Eighth Sunday after Trinity The Feast of St James Matthew 20:20-28 Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2021

I wonder what this passage has to say to our church?

Being part of the 'established church' that is the official Church of England set up under Henry VIII we certainly know something or indeed quite a bit of what it is to have privilege, power and status. We have certainly often been given the best places in society. We do well to remember this is our story.

In our gospel passage we have a wonderful mum wanting the best for her children and falling down on her knees to ask Jesus to give it to them. Who can criticise her for that? Jesus certainly doesn't. However, James and John's mum is looking for their flourishing and wellbeing in all the wrong places or should I say by the wrong means. This is very understandable and we often do the same both in our personal life and in our church life. We want to have the best place and when we and others focus on this, inevitably conflict arises as it did between the disciples.

The life Jesus advocates and offers to this faithful mum and his disciples has a very different understanding of what security, honour and power look like. It is forged through the difficulties and sufferings of life. We like James, John and the other disciples will inevitably share this cup of suffering and in it and through it we find life and love and the ground of all being. Jesus speaks in our passage of true security, honour and power being marked by the service to others. Finding our own wellbeing and flourishing in the wellbeing and flourishing of all and not in being better than others.

So back to our wonderful church. We can be tempted to hanker after a by gone age when more fully the church was given by right the best places in society. However, this would be missing the work of the spirit in the church's life today. Missing the invitation to share in Jesus' cup of suffering and its call to find faith, hope and love there. We are called as a church back to the true seat of security, honour and prestige that of loving service. When the church down the ages has been called back to this loving service and the support of the wellbeing and flourishing of all, it has found that it has been renewed and refreshed. In our service of others our church will flourish.
