Reflection by Hillarie Griggs

Thirteen Sunday after Trinity
James 1:17-27
Sunday 29th August 2021

In this passage James, the brother of Jesus and leader of the early church in Jerusalem, explores what it means to be a disciple and how this affects the way we live our lives. He starts by asking Who is God?

James calls God the "Father of Lights" referring to the story in Genesis where the first gift God gave was light and on the fourth day the lights became the sun, the moon and the stars. Without our sun's light and heat there would be no life on Earth and we simply would not exist. Our very lives and all we have come from Him.

James also reminds us that through Jesus we are called to be the first fruits. This means we belong to God and are expected to be examples of how people of God should lead their lives. We show this by our behaviour to others. James' advice is that we should "Be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry." How many times have we done this in the wrong order and been quick to be angry and spoken before we have considered the consequences, or even before we have really listened to what we are being told. How often have we ignored the good advice to count to 10 before saying something in anger. It does not mean that we shouldn't get angry but we need to know what it is that is making us angry. That it is not just because we are feeling tired and irritable. That it is not an expression of our own selfishness, fear or desire to be in control. When we slow our anger down we may learn what it is that is really making us angry and we are then able to do something about it.

James also urges us to be "doers of the word not merely hearers". If we are just hearers of the word we are like someone who looks into a mirror and then forgets what they are supposed to look like. That would be absurd. It would be the same foolishness to hear the Word of God and not act on it. It is

through our words and actions that our faith is seen by others. When we allow our hearts to be transformed by God it will change our lives. If we become doers it has the potential to improve the lives of the most vulnerable, the orphans and widows in scripture. We need to be listeners to the hurt, pain and suffering of those around us and then walk alongside them, supporting them and building good relationships. It is by caring and supporting each other that we are blessed.

As I reflect on the illustration of a mirror and remember that in Genesis we are told that we are created in the image of God I wonder how am I reflecting the love of God to others. Every morning we use a mirror to get ready to face the world. We think of the image we want to project, this usually means making sure we have not left breakfast or toothpaste around our mouths or that our hair is at least reasonably tidy. Maybe we need to use scripture and our knowledge of God through Jesus to see how are lives are supposed to look and then readjust our lives accordingly. But first we need to look in the mirror and remind ourselves that we are loved and chosen by God in our own uniqueness, that we are not trying to do everything just doing our part. To be and reflect the image of God in the way only we can.
