## **Reflection by Reverend Tony Meek**

Fourteenth Sunday after Trinity Proper 18 Year B Mark 7:24-37 Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> September 2021

The Christian healing ministry is both awesome and fulfilling. The healing power is not of the healer, who is only a channel, a focus for the healing power of God.

Those two stories of Jesus the healer in our gospel today had happy results. And significant points in the story of the daughter of the Syrophoenician woman is that he was healing a Gentile and that Jesus was not physically with her for the healing to take place.

One of our problems as Christians is that not everyone we pray for gets better. When the great preacher and healer David Watson died of cancer some years ago, many of his followers were distraught. Their prayers had failed. They felt that they hadn't tried hard enough. Or even that in some way he had not been worthy.

C S Lewis once wrote that what we cannot bear is the thought that there may be no one out there to hear our prayers. We can take the answer "No", as long as we know that it is the answer provided by God. God does not work by vague general laws. He works by particular purposes for particular people. But those purposes are always worked out in dialogue with us. They take into account our desires and choices and indeed, dare we say, can be modified by them.

Christ at first refused the request of the Syrophoenician woman. But her bold determination won and changed the heart of Jesus. So what is in our Gospel today for us? Jesus teaches us that there is no need to feel guilty if we sometimes need to get away from the pressures and familiarities of our daily lives. So many of us look forward to being able to go away on holiday again. Many, like Jennie and I, are not yet brave enough even to consider that. But, when we can, I am sure we will come back the better enabled to deal with things.

Jesus teaches us that his message is for all mankind, not just his own people, the Jews. He teaches us that his physical presence is not required for the miracle of God's healing power to take effect.

Above all, he teaches that we should pray honestly and wholeheartedly for what we really want. Writing in the Church Times many years ago, Richard Harries, then my Bishop in Oxford diocese, said: "*The religion of all of us has a great deal of unreality about it. We should bring into our prayers what is most urgent and real to us, and come to those prayers with the faith that God is real. Our request may or may not be granted. But we will discern more of the purpose of God for us: our religion will become more real.*"
