Third Sunday of Advent Sunday 12th December 2021

As we travel together through Advent on our way to Christmas, we pause today to spend a moment with someone else who was pointing towards the coming of the Christ: St John the Baptist. John went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

John warned us to flee from the wrath to come; it sounds like a message of fear. Jesus appeals to us to enter into life; his is a gospel of love.

Jesus did start his teaching from where John had to leave off. He acknowledged openly that John had been his forerunner, preparing the way for him. He took up the theme of judgement, and the need for a revolution in morality.

What John could not have foreseen was that Jesus would be initiating a new order and not just bringing an old order to an end.

For Jesus, the kingdom of God was not only to be expected, but welcomed and prayed for. To enter into it would require as much change of heart as the judgement which was the theme of the preaching of John. In a sense, John is giving a warning, and Jesus promising a new life.

What is common to both messages is the need for repentance, for a change of heart and outlook and of one's way of life.

The preaching of repentance remains an essential part of the Christian message. I know that for some forty years I have written and spoken about it more than about any other topic! It is common to both Old and New Testaments. When the prophet Joel says, *'Rend your heart, and not your garments, and turn unto the LORD your God.* (Joel 2.13), it seems a very Old Testament theme.

But at the close of the great sermon by Peter at Pentecost those who heard it said, '*Brothers, what shall we do?*' (Acts 2.37), to which the reply comes at once, '*Repent and be baptised*.'

There can be no acceptance of the salvation Jesus came to bring without repentance. Repentance is not just about saying sorry. It means a complete change of direction in our lives. It means turning and walking away from what we have done wrong, and it means walking with Christ towards the kingdom of God.

John the Baptist was indeed preparing the way for Jesus. His message of repentance remains essential as a preparation for the coming of Christ into our hearts. It remains essential as we prepare once more to celebrate the coming of the Son of God as a tiny baby in a manger in Bethlehem.

Repentance: turning and walking away from what we have done wrong, and walking with Christ towards the kingdom of God.

If you remember nothing else that any minister says or writes this Advent, I implore you to remember that.
