Wedding at Cana

Last week there was a Baptism. This week there's a Wedding. Sounds pretty human!

Except that the person getting baptised was Jesus - in the River Jordan - by his cousin John the Baptist and Jesus and his mother Mary, were among the guests at the wedding in Cana. Two very normal 'rites-of passage' ceremonies. Two ceremonies based on love. The first the love of God being passed down by the Holy Spirit, to the person getting baptised. The second the love between two people, being blessed by God.

The wedding was in Cana, some 8 miles north of Nazareth, where Jesus was brought up. Mary, Jesus and maybe some of his disciples were among the guests. It may have been the wedding of a relative or friend, we aren't told. Weddings often went on for a week. Lots of drink and food involved. Guests came and went. Then disaster - the wine began to run out. An awkward situation for the host and a great embarrassment - what to do? Mary notices what is happening. Maybe the disciples had not been expected and had not been catered for. She nudges Jesus, 'do something', she says. At first, he is a bit reluctant to get involved.

Water jars were standing by. Made of earthenware or stone, probably to keep the water cool. The water would have been used for washing and purification. Jesus asks for the jars to be filled with water. He asks for some of the water to be drawn off. It is taken to the chief steward, who discovers a beautiful wine. The wedding is saved, it can continue.

The water jars are thought to represent the old covenant. Water and washing were important, but the rituals had become too important. They involved spending hours a day washing, everything. Hands, feet, clothes, plates, furniture and drinking vessels. Washing had become a bit of a bore; but it was also a religious duty. The jars had become full of wine, representing the blessings of the new kingdom. The new wine of Christ's kingdom contrasts with the old water of the Old Testament.

There are many theological thoughts and ideas about this wedding. Let's not forget the human quality and the love of God that shines through.




Image: The Marriage Feast at Cana by Juan de Flandes (Died 1519)
