Baptism of Christ Luke 3:15-17, 21-22 Sunday 9th January 2022

As we celebrate the Baptism of Christ here are some brief quotes and thoughts along with the symbols of baptism to stimulate and aid your reflection.

Two quotes and thoughts inspired by the late Rachel Held Evans

'Identity - it's always God's first move' - Nadia Bolz-Weber

When Jesus emerged from the water of the river of Jordan a voice from heaven declared "This is my son whom I love, with him I am well pleased". Jesus did not begin to be loved at his baptism or ceased to be loved when his baptism became a memory. Baptism named and declared the reality of his belovedness. So it is with us. In baptism we are named and identified as beloved children of God.

'How bold one gets when one is sure of being loved' - Sigmund Freud

After Jesus was baptised he was tempted for 40 days in the desert. He was bold and free in the face of these temptations. This freedom was ultimately expressed in his journey to the cross and beyond. In baptism we make the public and audacious claim that neither evil or death gets the final word on who we are. We declare that we are a beloved child of God and we renounce anything or anyone who says or tells us otherwise. We declare that death in all its forms is powerless against love.

Actions speak louder than words: how do the symbols of baptism speak to you today?

Suggestion: jot down or perhaps draw your responses in the spaces to the right of each picture.

Cross: the sign of the cross traced on the forehead



Journey: the walking from front of church to the font at the back



Water: used three times baptising in the name of Farther, Son and Holy Spirit.



Oil: anointing and praying for the guidance and empowering of the Holy Spirit



Candle: lit from the Paschal Candle, a candle is given recognising the light of all lights that enlightens everyone.



Heavenly Father, by the power of your Holy Spirit you give to your faithful people new life in the water of baptism. Guide and strengthen us by the same Spirit, that we who are born again may serve you in faith and love, and grow into the full stature of your Son, Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit now and for ever. Amen
