Luke 6:20-31
All Saints and All Souls
30th October 2022

All Saints Sunday 2022

The nights are drawing in - the wind is dragging the beautiful leaves of autumn to the ground leaving bare winter trees - the clocks have gone back and the darkness builds around us. These are obvious signs of the year passing - and yet I am always surprised when, suddenly, All Saints Sunday is here. Then when it comes, someone it seems, puts their foot on the accelerator - and All Souls and Remembrance Sunday rush into Advent and the crazily wonderful season of Christmas. Another year has passed in the life of the Church and the World - and All Saints Sunday can be thought of as the trigger point of this concluding season. But All Saints isn't a one-day celebration leading to other special events in the life of the Church as we approach Advent and Christmas. It's a festival which brings the long "green" season of Trinity to a conclusion and launches us into another season which bridges the path to Advent. We call it the Kingdom season. It's a season which directs our thoughts to the final phrases of the creed - 'the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins and the life of the world to come'.

Yet, All Saints Sunday often has a focus on the individual saints - those in every age who have lived virtuous and godly lives and whose example inspires us today. These are the "big name" saints - from the Bible and the years of history of the Christian Church. We probably all have our favourite saints - and as we thank God for

them, we wish we could emulate them. But there are so many others who live brave and saintly lives. We may never know their names, but we admire their deeds, their commitment and their sacrifice. They can inspire us to greater things perhaps - and encourage us to show a glimpse of the love which comes from God and makes the world a better place. Unfortunately, they can also show us how far we fall from our ideals - show us our weakness and frailty, our selfishness and sinfulness. Far from encouraging us, they can put us in touch with our inadequacy and the fact that we are just frail human beings. As we move towards Advent we have to face this reality - and the awareness that it is only God who can give us the love and strength we need to grow more into his image and to take our place in the communion of saints.

Can I suggest, then - that as well as trying to follow the examples of the heroes of our faith - we see them as part of God's kingdom - part of the 'clouds of witnesses' - part of the communion of saints. The saints - known and unknown - are the real men and women of every age in whose lives we can glimpse heaven in our midst. They are here among us today taking their place as members of God's kingdom 'on earth as it is in heaven'. God lives in them and has his being in the way they live their lives. They are not perfect but 'work in progress' - striving and failing, and filled with God's grace and love, continuing to build the Kingdom. God is already at work amongst us - yet we don't always notice this - and may miss the chance of joining the communion of saints from our position here on earth.

So through this season of All Saints - as we celebrate the Sundays of the Kingdom - let's strive to notice the signs of God active in the saints in our midst - and join in the building of his Kingdom here and now, and as a preparation for the life of the world to come.
