Second Sunday of Advent Advent 2 Year A 4th December 2022 Matthew 3:1-12

John The Baptist

Perhaps I am timid, but John's preaching would have frightened me out of my wits. It sounds like blood and thunder, similar to the hellfire type of sermon one associates with those ultra-evangelical preachers of the nineteenth century.

The contrast between Jesus and John, both in preaching and lifestyle, seems immense. John lived rough, a definite ascetic. When Jesus spoke of John at the time of John's arrest, St Matthew reports him as saying "For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, 'He has a demon.' The Son of Man came eating and drinking and they say, 'Here is a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners.' (Matt 11.18-19)

John warned people to flee from the wrath to come; it sounds like a message of fear. Jesus appealed to people to enter into life; his was a gospel of love. Even the preaching of John about the coming of Jesus sounds like a warning. "His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing-floor, gathering his wheat into the barn and burning up the chaff with unquenchable fire." (Matt 3.12)

It is only too easy to contrast the severity of all this with the gentleness of Jesus, and the homeliness of his parables. We have to admire the courage of John the Baptist and we know that he met his end in prison because he had openly rebuked Herod on account of his matrimonial affairs.

Jesus did start his teaching from where John had to leave off. He acknowledged openly that John had been his forerunner, preparing the way for him. He took up the theme of judgement, and the need for a revolution in morality. What John could not have foreseen was that Jesus would be initiating a new order and not just bringing an old order to an end.

As John was preparing for the coming of Jesus, so we must prepare throughout Advent for two events. Most immediately, we must make a straight path in our lives so that we may properly celebrate the feast of the nativity. We must ensure that we are ready to remember how God became man in a stable in Bethlehem. He had to be born among us so that He could die for us.

And we prepare not just by addressing our cards, buying our presents and putting up our decorations; although, if any of those things make us think, however imperfectly, of Christmas, I would never belittle them. We need to be planning our Christmas worship, our reunions, our hospitality, our generosity. We need to think about those aspects of our celebration of Christmas which make it different from those who are not celebrating the birth of their Saviour.

John the Baptist was indeed preparing the way for Jesus. His message of repentance remains essential as a preparation for the coming of Christ into our hearts. It remains essential as we prepare once more to celebrate the coming of the Son of God as a tiny baby in a manger in Bethlehem.

Prepare a path for Jesus to enter your home this Christmas time and a path for him to enter and remain at the centre of your life for all time.
