# CAIRNS, CLOUDS AND MOUNTAINS;

Cairns are good fun to build. That small pile of stones we build at a place we want to remember. A walk we have enjoyed maybe. Most Tors on Dartmoor will have a few to mark the spot of a picnic or an expedition remembered. A couple of weeks ago I saw a collection of little cairns that had been built in a dried up river bed. They looked almost like a natural phenomena, but I expect they disappeared quickly enough when the water returned. Cairns may have a sadder use too - perhaps marking the place where a beloved pet or even a person lies buried.

Today's Bible readings tell us about the ascent of two mountains. The first is about Moses going up Mt. Sinai to receive the 10 Commandments. The second tells how Jesus went up a mountain with Peter, James and John and was 'transfigured before them'. Peter in today's epistle refers to the event. Both events mention stones. Moses was asked to build a stone altar. Peter asked Jesus if he could build a cairn, shrine or dwelling - (depending on translation).

Rocks, stones and pebbles are all around us. They are part of the ground beneath our feet. For centuries we have built shelters, houses, palaces with them. We use them to build bridges and lighthouses. We use them as gravestones and monuments to remember people. We use them to show the way at crossroads or to record distances. If you have time this week, you may like to find a pebble - rough or smooth, hold it in your hand and just spend a few moments thinking about it, feeling it. What's its story? Where did it come from, how and when was it formed? What colour is it and why? Feel its energy, be aware of its shape, weight and texture.

Mountain climbing is often a challenge. People challenge themselves to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro or the Munros in Scotland. Mountain climbing requires skill, fitness and good planning. Moses went up Mt. Sinai in a storm, Jesus and the 3 disciples climbed a mountain. They all may have experienced fatigue and even exhaustion. Mountains give us a challenge. Everyday life can give us a challenge, being a Christian can give us a challenge too. In today's events people came down from the mountains feeling refreshed, enthused and inspired. Sometimes challenges can bring the same feelings.

While Moses and Jesus were up in the mountains, they were enveloped in cloud. Thick cloud with little or no visibility, wet clothing from the moisture in the cloud and slippery surfaces. We can feel lost, uncertain where we are, even frightened as we wander around trying to find the right way to go. Lent can feel a bit like this too, a bit like we are stuck in a cloud, quite bewildering, a bit unknown. A time when we don't quite know where to go, what to do. Lent is not necessarily a time of giving up chocolate biscuits or giving up sugar on your porridge. It's time to study, to reflect finding out where we are on the Christian pathway. How can we move forward? Maybe it's a chance to do something positive each day. Lent starts on Wednesday. We have two books to follow and a Quiet Day in Woodland. Finally, we will experience Holy week and Easter. By then the cloud will have dispersed and we can come down from the mountain feeling enthused and inspired.

Have a 'good' Lent and enjoy your pancakes on Tuesday.!
