Fourth Sunday of Easter 30th April 2023

This fourth Sunday of the Easter season is sometimes called Good Shepherd Sunday because each year the lectionary gives us a reading from part of chapter ten of John's Gospel. This chapter sets the framework for Jesus' teaching about himself as the Good Shepherd. This year we read only the first 10 verses.

Jesus always used rich and familiar images from daily life to illustrate the point he was trying to teach. Did you know that sheep are mentioned more than 200 times in the Bible, and if you also count lambs and rams the number goes up to over 500, more than any other animal? Sheep with their shepherds were a very familiar sight in the countryside during biblical times, as it still is if you visit the Holy Land today. Sheep were important as sources of wool, milk, and meat, and throughout the Bible, sheep served as symbols for God's people. God is portrayed as the shepherd of his chosen flock in the prophetic words of Isaiah and Ezekiel, and most famously in the 23rd Psalm.

In today's passage Jesus names himself as the gate for the sheep. He does not name himself as the Good Shepherd until verse 11. In Jesus' time as night came and before darkness fell the shepherds would herd their sheep, sometimes several flocks together, either into a cave, an enclosure or a temporary structure made from cut thorn branches. Each would have a gap which a shepherd would lie across keeping the sheep from danger, safe from roaming thieves, bandits and wolves. When morning came, a shepherd would call to his own sheep who,

recognising his voice, would follow him as he led them out to graze again. Jesus naming himself as the gate also speaks to me of Psalm 121 v 8 "the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore." The gate would meet all their needs by allowing the sheep to come and go, when closed keeping them safe inside and opening to lead them out into new pastures.

Today's passage ends with the phrase that Jesus "came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." What does Jesus mean to live abundantly? He was not calling us to consumerism and greed, acquiring things we don't need or really want. An abundant life is more meaningful than material wealth and prosperity and is not dependant on the things we have. An abundant life is not necessary a life of comfort and ease but it is a life lived with joy as you learn to trust God. In a life lived abundantly there is freedom to be yourself.

Think about your own life. In what ways might it be called abundant? If it is abundant, what could you share or reduce, and still be living abundantly?
