# **Reflection by Tessa Amies**

Sixth Sunday of Easter 14<sup>th</sup> May 2023

### UNKNOWN GODS AND WARRIORS

Westminster Abbey has been in the news quite a bit lately. If you are ever fortunate enough to enter by the great west door you will quickly come across a prominent black stone laid into the floor with flowers arranged around it. This is the tomb of the Unknown Warrior.

The inscription on it begins:

Beneath this stone
Rests the body of a British Warrior,
Unknown by name or rank
Brought from France to lie among
The most illustrious of the land.
And buried here on
Armistice Day 11th November 1920
in the presence of
His Majesty King George V .......

This was an idea put forward by a military chaplain - David Railton - who had served in France and Belgium during the First World War. Four unknown soldiers were exhumed and one was chosen to be buried in the Abbey, to represent all those soldiers who had died and were unidentified and had no marked grave. Soil was brought from France and a piece of black Belgian marble was laid on top.

This grave is placed in the centre of the aisle, just in front of the West Door. Everyone using that door has to make a detour around the grave (even newly coronated Kings). It cannot be ignored. It has to be respected. Royal brides who are married in the abbey traditionally place their bouquets on the Tomb.

In one of today's readings from Acts Ch.17, we hear how Paul found an altar 'To an unknown God' while he was visiting Athens.

He was waiting for Timothy and Silas to join him and had a few days to spare.

Like many of us, he went to look at some of the sites in that great city and also spent time teaching and talking with philosophers. Eventually he was given a chance to speak to the great council. He began by complimenting them on the variety of religions he had found in the town. Then he mentioned that he had found an altar dedicated to 'The Unknown God'. This he explained, was the god he had come to tell them about. He started with a brief résumé of Jewish beliefs and God the creator, then went on to talk about Jesus Christ, his life, death, and resurrection. Some believed him, some laughed at him.

Paul was clever to link this 'unknown god' to Christ. Having the space for something 'unknown' appeals whether it be a god or a warrior. Some cultures leave a space for the 'unknown stranger' at the dinner table, so they can share your meal. It can be seen as clever or perhaps a little devious of even 'hedging your bets' perhaps. The unknown is often intriguing.

'In him we live and move and have our being'.
