Reflection by Rev'd Andrew Down

Second Sunday after Trinity 18th June 2023

We are in the month of lots of Patronal festivals with three of our five churches having their patronal festivals in June. This Sunday St John the Baptist Woodland will celebrate their Patronal Festival at 9.30am.

When you think of John Baptist what comes to mind?

When you think of Woodland Church what comes to mind?

What are the connections between the dedication and the gifts and character of the church?

For me, as I ask myself these questions, I am struck by the wilderness connection. John baptised and preached repentance in the wilderness, he declared the kingdom of heaven to be at hand and he prepared the way for his cousin Jesus and baptised him in the wilderness as he began his ministry. The church in Woodland is arguably the most remote in our family of churches. At times travelling to Woodland can feel like going out to the wilderness. Importantly the wilderness in the bible is a place of testing, encounter, renewal and revelation.

All of these descriptions could be applied to the recent very moving quiet day we held at Woodland. This was in no small part due to the separateness of the place that made the day and the time so special. What an amazing resource to have in our Beacon Family – a place of wilderness with all that that means. That said Woodland's wilderness is one with much abundance (and indeed hospitality as we well know) just like this wonderful picture of a sitting John the Baptist in an abundant wilderness transformed by God's love and grace. Certainly our own Woodland is an extraordinary place of love and grace. If you haven't been for a while or at all, why not make the pilgrimage and see for yourself.

As we celebrate the importance of Woodland church this weekend and its place in our Beacon Family it also causes me to reflect on the identity of our other churches and their dedications. What links are there to be made between...

...the church in Broadhempston and St Peter and St Paul (or as I prefer - this churches first dedication - St Petroc);

... the church in Torbyran and the Trinity?

Once you have done this why not think of the other 4 churches in our Beacon Family and what their identity and gifts are and do some research about the people they are dedicated to? As a Cornishman, long-time resident of Devon, lover of holidays in Brittany and with Welsh family may I suggest you start with St Petroc!
