Reflection by Tessa Amies

Third Sunday after Trinity 25th June 2023

Greetings to all at Broadhempston Church, who will be celebrating their Patronal Festival this weekend. Not just the building, but all who attend the church and the wider community too.

Last week Father Andrew reminded us that 3 of our 5 churches in the Mission Community would be celebrating their Patronal Festivals this month. Today is the turn of Broadhempston. Their Church is dedicated to two Saints – St Peter and St Paul – two hardworking people who dedicated their lives to the call of Christ.

Peter (originally called Simon and later Cephas = rock) probably came from Bethsaida, near the sea of Galilee. He and his brother Andrew were fishermen, used to rough waters, squally winds, pulling ropes and gutting fish – hard tough lives.

Peter answered Christ's call and became one of the leading apostles. He witnessed the Transfiguration, the raising of Jairios's daughter and the agony in the garden. He denied Christ 3 times, then heard the cock crow and repented bitterly. He seems to be very 'human' apt to be wrong and right, had his ups and downs like us all. Yet he is commissioned by Christ.

"Thou art Peter and on this rock, I will build my church"

Some of you may have visited the Holy Land and seen the actual place where this is thought to have taken place. A small church and a large flat piece of rock, solid and impressive, a good firm foundation.

Another slab of solid rock can be found in the quarry at Orley Common, on the road from Ipplepen to Broadhempston. This would be a good hard rock to build a church on – good firm foundation.

Peter's symbols are a set of keys (the keys of heaven) and a ship, or a fish or a cockrell.

Paul came from Tarsus, he trained as a pharisee and also a tent maker. A devout and kearned Jew, feared by Christians, then miraculously converted to Christianity on the road to Damascus (Acts Ch.9). After this conversion, he spent three years in Arabia in prayer and solitude.

He was a traveller, making three missionary journeys in Asia Minor. He was arrested, pleaded Roman citizenship (because he came from Tarsus) and over several years was taken to Rome for his trial. He was shipwrecked off Malta, acquitted of his trial and continued to travel and write to all the early churches he had founded. He was probably executed in Rome and buried just outside the city.

Paul's symbols are a cross and a book. He is the patron saint of tent makers, rope makers, musicians and writers, amongst others.

Paul was an intrepid traveller. Getting to Broadhempston can be quite a journey. Narrow lanes, few passing places, potholes, icy hills and even toads and giraffes may assail you from every side! It's good to travel alongside Paul!

Finally – ST PETROC – mentioned by Father Andrew last week. Who was he? Where did he come from? What did he do and why was he relevant to Broadhempston Church?

A 6th Century Saint, born and bred in South Wales, sailed across to Cornwall where he founded a monastery at Padstow (Petroc-Stowe, or Petroc's Place). He studied in Ireland and made a pilgrimage to Rome. In folklore he is said to have banished several monsters and dragons, among them a very large snake with an insatiable appetite who lived in the mud – Cornwall.

Petroc and his helpers approached the snake's lair. The snake was overwhelmed by the holiness of the 3 men. They bound the snake then ordered it to leave the shores of Cornwall. It swam away and has never been seen again.

St etroc founded a second monastery on Bodmin Moor and several Churches in Devon and Cornwall were dedicated to him – did this include an early church in Broadhempston?

St Petroc's symbol is a stag, in appreciation of his love of wildlife.









P.S. There is a Festival of Flowers in Denbury from Friday 7th July to Sunday 9th July. Local groups are joining with the British Academy of Floral Art from Exeter, to produce what I am sure will be wonderful displays. It will be an example of GOD'S WONDERFUL CREATION! In all its glory!
