Reflection by Hillarie Griggs

Seventh Sunday after Trinity 23rd July 2023

Are you disturbed by what is happening in the world at the moment; wars, violence, injustice and inequality? Don't you just wish that God would jump in and solve all the world's and your own problems right now and forever. If that is your thought, you would be acting exactly like the slaves in today's parable and their request to go and gather the weeds in immediately.

The answer given to them is that it would be too early and both the weeds and the wheat would be disturbed and uprooted. When they are young the two plants are indistinguishable. It is not that the Master ignores and pretends that the weeds do not exist. He has the vision that the weeds and wheat can be separated more safely and easily if it is done after the crop is fully grown when the differences between them can be seen. It reminds us that the problem of good and evil is more complex than we would like it to be. In faith and hope we believe that God will win and good will overcome evil.

In the parable we are reminded that God's timing is not our timing but He does have a purpose. If judgement comes too early, when we are not fully formed, there would no chance for us to acknowledge our sins, to ask for forgiveness and ultimately there would be no chance of redemption. God desires everyone to be saved and to become His children. God loves each one of us and sees us as we really are. He has revealed Himself as supremely loving, wise, holy, merciful and just. It is these characteristics that we must remember when it comes to the matter of judgement. We must not be tempted to see God as a sadistic monster or a far too soft and indulgent grandparent. God does not inflict dreadful punishment on us as sinners. He has patience with us allowing us to ask for forgiveness, to change our ways and again put our trust in him.

We are also reminded that it is not our job but God's to judge. If we are honest with ourselves, we would admit that we are very quick to identify with being the wheat but each of us needs to be aware that we really are a mixture of wheat and weeds. We also find it hard to admit our tendency to rush in and judge others. We are quick to decide who is in and who is out especially if we are *certain* that our point of view is the only valid one. We can then spend an inordinate amount of time and energy criticising and condemning other people. It does seem that our natural reaction to those we disagree with is for them to become our enemies. To think of them as the weeds and that they need removing. Jesus taught that we can point out their mistakes, but we are not entitled to judge them. Not easy when we have already decided who are the weeds and who are the wheat.
