## Reflection by Rev'd Anne Burden

Fifth Sunday after Trinity 9th July 2023

The New Testament readings for the Sundays in the season of Trinity have been from the letter to the Romans - and I must admit that I've often struggled to make sense of them. In truth - and this is a greater confession! - I've sometimes slipped over them, and hoped that the Gospel reading would have something more straightforward to say. But less need for panic this week - Romans is, I think, much clearer.

Paul is writing about finding himself unable to do what he knows is right - and his context is one of his explorations of Jewish law and regulations for living. As a teacher of the faith, Paul is a master of this - but he also has the insight and humility to realise that he doesn't always want to do what he knows is right. He refers to this as sin. Paul has failed in his wish to be righteous because thoughts and desires are not enough - action is necessary. As we all know - actions speak louder than words. Indeed, a person cannot be thought of as 'good' unless knowledge of what is right and good leads to action. This is the problem with the Jewish law - and with our laws and regulations today. Law can give knowledge of what is good, but it cannot overcome the power of sin sufficiently to motivate a person to do what is good. Law is unable to make anyone good. What is needed is a movement of the heart - and this is where the power of Christ might come in.

The Gospel passage today makes it clear that those listening to Jesus will never be satisfied. On the one hand they appear to want precise instructions about the Christian faith - but then they criticise and knock down what they hear, whether the preacher is John the Baptist, Jesus himself - or perhaps anyone. The problem is that people are too set in their self-righteous, religious ways to recognise the things of God which might present themselves differently from their expectations.

The same idea is continued in Jesus' saying about his "easy yoke" - "his yoke is easy and his burden is light". I think what Jesus is calling for is both easier and harder. It is not a formal yoke of specific, legalistic religious requirements - but a yoke of commitment to Jesus, pure and simple. Jesus has the power to turn the hearts of those in relationship with him, so that they can live a life of love. This is what our Christian discipleship has to be about - living in relationship with Jesus and responding to his gift of love - so that we can reflect that love and acceptance to those we meet, and live together in peace and harmony in the light of God's love.

So often, when we think of how to move forward with the problems of society today, we talk about making stricter laws and enforcing them more rigorously. This will never work unless it leads to hearts and lives being changed. Knowing all that there is to know about the law - however good it is - doesn't necessarily make good people. It might just make clever and successful criminals. Christ's way of filling those who are damaged and empty with love and acceptance, isn't being weak and 'wishwashy liberal' - whatever people might say to us. In fact, it may be just enough to start the process of turning hearts and building a more united, loving and righteous world.
