

A WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY.

'WHO IS MY NEIGHBOUR'?

This Sunday falls right in the middle of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity'
'Churches Together' have put together a booklet containing thoughts and prayers about the week, based around the story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10.v.25-37).
Starting with the Lawyer's question
Who is my neighbour?

The Prayers and Reflections are put together by the Churches in Burkina Faso in West Africa. Burkina Faso is in the Sahel region and borders the countries of Mali and Niger. About 64% of the population is Muslim, 9% follow the traditional African religions and 26% are Christian. A major jihadist attack in 2016 has led to a period of terrorist attacks, lawlessness and human trafficking. Schools, health centres and town halls have had to close. Christians have been particularly targeted and many priests and religious leaders have been killed. However the churches there strongly believe that the love of Christ unites all Christians and they commit themselves to walking the path of the love of Christ and of neighbour. They ask for our prayers.

GLOBAL: Consider your neighbours in a different part of the world. (Perhaps Burkina

Faso) Pray for them and try to find out more about them and to understand

them.
